

**Parenthetical, in-text citation styles for online sources:**

1. When deciding on how to punctuate a sentence, "in many cases you will have to rely on your judgment to decide what readers need" (Turabian 230).

[Since no source is given in the text, cite the author and page, if there is a page. Cite every source, every time.]

2. Fox News, according to David Carr's column in this morning's *New York Times*, "lulled its conservative base with agit-prop" during its election coverage.

[No citation needed because Carr is named as the source and no page number is needed because the source is an online newspaper with no page numbers.]

3. On the set of Fox News, Karl Rove said the network's decision to call the election for President Obama was "premature ... and ignoring important data" (qtd. in Carr, "For One Night").

[This citation is for a paper in which two stories by Carr are referenced, so a shortened version of the title is included. If the citation were for print, a section and page number would be added, i.e., (qtd. in Carr, "For One Night" B1). Also, Carr is quoting Rove; hence the need for the "qtd. in."]

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The "Works Cited" is a separate page, always. Center "Works Cited" (no quotation marks, no underline) and use a hanging indent. Double space and add no extra spaces between citations.
